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Tomingley Gold Project reports and overview of activities: Jade Buckman presented his report. J. Buckman spoke to each of the pages from a handout he had previously prepared. Comments and questions made in addition to what was contained in the report were; • In relation to the allocation of funds to community groups J. Hamilton suggested the total amount, since the start be promoted as a way of highlighting the financial assistance provided to the local area. This would be in addition to the individual recipients being announced each time. • P. Brydon asked A. Brown when will the new section of the highway be completed. A. Brown explained if all runs to plan it will be completed early next year.	
Alkane-TGO CCC exploration update June 2026: Alex Cherry's presentation A. Cherry spoke to each of the pages from his handout. Comments and questions made in addition to what was contained in the report were; • A. Cherry spoke of a complaint having been received from one of the locals in the area, as they were disturbed due to the drilling at night. A. Cherry acknowledge he could have responded quicker to the complaint. The complainant submitted a formal complaint to the Resources Regulator, a state body, who then contacted Tomingley Operations. Drilling near residence now no longer occurs at night and there is improved communication with all parties who may be affected from the light or noise. • In relation to the formal complaint B. Leake commented Tomingley Operations appears to have a good track record, in relation to not receiving complaints. A. Cherry agreed and noted the complaint was directed at the Exploration team, not Tomingley Operations, as they are two separate entities. A. Brown commented he was made aware of the situation and liaised with A. Cherry to ensure the issue was rectified. • The deep core hole at Peak Hill which is co-funded with NSW state government, was initially to be to a depth of 1.5km, this was drilled further to a depth of 1.65km. While only the first 600m has been processed so far; at this point the hole appears 'interesting'. There is a chance there may be copper underground. Copper is of interest for the state government, hence the co-funding of the core hole. J. Buckman asked when will the core from the deep drill hole be processed. A. Cherry said, within a month.	
General Business: • B. Leake asked about the current water limitations in relation to the expansion of the mine. J. Buckman and A. Brown explained there are plans being developed to increase water availability, largely through another bore being developed along Dappo Road near Narromine. Tomingley Operations is in consultation with the water licensing regulator regarding the additional water. To improve the delivery of the additional water a booster pump between Narromine and Tomingley may be	

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installed. Water from the waste plant is also being processed and recycled, as opposed to going to the tailings dam. • P. Brydon asked how deep will the new bore on Dappo Road be? J. Buckman said, "I think about the fifty metre mark but I'll have to come back to you on that." • T. Ellis enquired about the technology to extract the gold from the sulphides at the Peak Hill mine. A. Cherry explained while the technology has been available it was cost prohibitive at the time of closure to process the sulphides further for gold. Current gold prices may make the exercise financially viable.	J. Buckman – bore depth on Dappo Rd
